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## ABOUT VIBE

VIBE engages young people living in under-resourced neighbourhoods in and around Toronto in high quality and accessible arts education programs that are meaningful, relevant, and collaboratively developed with community and education partners. VIBE positions arts programs in schools and neighbourhoods to strengthen communities and provide children and youth opportunities to become empowered and reach their full potential as artists, leaders, and social/cultural contributors. Our work begins with the assets found within communities we work in and invites young people to explore, re-envision and make new connections to themselves and the world around them. All VIBE programs are facilitated by emerging artists and an established artist who mentors in facilitation and technical skill-building, providing hands-on experience and practical professional development.

VIBE Arts was founded in 1987 and received charitable status in 1995. We recently changed our name from Arts for Children and Youth to VIBE Arts to better reflect the populations we engage. VIBE started as an arts scholarship provider for marginalized young people. In 2002, VIBE evolved to concentrate on arts educational programming directly in the community, resulting in collaborative programs that were more accessible to larger child and youth populations. In 2009, founder/ED Lola Rasminsky retired and Artistic Director Julie Frost became Executive and Artistic Director. VIBE began its work in 2 Toronto communities; today, we work in 22 Neighbourhood Improvement Areas.

VISION and MISSION

In 2015, we changed our name to VIBE Arts to mark our 20th anniversary of Arts for Children and Youth.

VISION: Vibrant communities where young people express themselves artistically and use their creativity and leadership to engage fully in the community.

MISSION: To work collaboratively with partners in underresourced communities to create a lasting impact on the lives of young people through arts education programming.

## 36 COMMUNITY EVENTS A YEAR

Our reach are in communities throughout Toronto and the GTA is significant. Our Toronto reach can be seen at our youth-led festival VIBE Arts Fest. We were fortunate as our outreach pushed its way from outside the city to reach regionally with projects like Welcome 41 for the Pan AM Games of 2015, even deeper into Toronto with NBA All-Star games in 2016, and in 2017 for the first time ever nationally for Canada's 150th birthday.

We have a presence in the lives of children and youth both at school level and community venue increasing opportunities of positive impact in their lives. We weclome recent immigrants from culutrally diverse backgrounds and low-income families in high-unemeployment communities to create welcomingspaces for connection and creative expression to be had.

## ACCESSIBILITY

ORGANIZATIONAL PILLARS

At VIBE Arts, we prioritize the accessibility of our programming. In order to reach stakeholders, children and youth, all VIBE multidisciplinary arts programs are free to attend. Our programming locations are determined mindfully in venues across the GTA that are easily accessed by diverse groups of individuals. Through strong partnerships, we utilize access to safe spaces including public libraries, schools, parks, hospitals, shelters, public housing, health centres, arenas and detention centres. Our programs flourish in these locations. We facilitate our programming at various times in an effort to gain the highest youth attendance possible. Our programming finds its stride during school hours, after class and on weekends for youth seeking extra-curricular organized engagement.

Across Toronto and GTA these programs engage 7000-10000 marginizalized children and youth ages 3-29 per year in $1500+$ workshops at 132 unique locations.

Collaboration is highly valued at VIBE and is present at every level of our organization. Our programming is successful thanks to our partners who offer extraordinary access to space, amenities, supervised support, marketing and outreach. Our roster of community partners is extensive and wide ranging. At the top of our list; public schools, employment agencies, shelters, youth detention centres, hospitals, hospices, park associations, newcomer settlement agencies, Indigenous groups, community and health centres, community housing associations, environmental agencies, libraries, museums, galleries, senior centres, social services, and other community arts groups. At the organizational level, we encourage collaboration among staff with each other as well as with media groups, artists, donors, volunteers, and our Youth Advisory Council and Board of Directors.

Highlighted Collaborations:
Beat of Your Own Drum Program:
In an effort to engage young patients with African drumming and dancing, we teamed up with the Center for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) for our Beat of Your Own Drum Program. With the generous support of the Slaight Family Foundation, patients were guided through the process of creating their own authentic Djembe drums from scratch. Once the drums had been made, participants took part in lessons to learn proper drumming techniques. It is no surprise that this successful workshop resulted in dancing! Even toddlers from a local community daycare joined in on the music-making.


Canada 150+
Our first national project was conducted as part of Canada's 150th Anniversary and involved over 30 community partners from across the country. Every province and territory participated in this VIBE Arts program. 500 youth from across our nation came together

 PILLARSin schools, detention centres, libraries, Indigenous Centres and hand-painted 60 original murals expressing why they love Canada. Through high profile partnerships with Canadian airports, PATTISON Outdoor Advertising, the Scarborough Town Centre, the Toronto Transit Commission and Canadian Embassies, our impressive murals were exhibited in 38 TTC subway station, 4 embassies in Australia, Israel, England and the USA, over 300 digital billboards across Canada, and in the Scarborough Town Centre for over two months. This high level of exposure awarded young, under-represented VIBE artists with unprecedented national exposure and credibility.


## Cultural Hotspot

The Cultural Hotspot project is a mural comprised of over 100 unique pieces, together forming a beautiful 70 foot depiction of community members through garden imagery. Over 130 young people from East York collaborated with VIBE Arts' artists Rob Matejka and emerging artist Frannie Potts to create an impressive outdoor mural for the East York Community Centre (EYCC) in Toronto. This project was a collaborative effort engaging children and youth from William Burgess Public School, EYCC, a local environmental group called East York Neighbourhood Initiative and Kennedy House Youth Shelter. Partners included the City of Toronto Arts Services and the local food bank. Upon seeing the completed mural, the secretary of William Burgess best described the impact of our project : "You've changed the neighbourhood".

## OUR IMPACT ON YOUTH

VIBE Arts in part of a collective with other arts charities called Platform A that awards artists mircrogrants to start their own community arts project. Two of our micro-grant recipients Igho Itebu and Tasneem Dairywala have recently succeeded not only in their Platform A affiliated projects but have gone on to pursue greater endevours as their projects have become larger initiatives. They attribute part of their success directly to the support and mentorship of VIBE Arts.

Both young leaders have been a part of the E4E (Entrepreneurs For Entrepreneurs) 6-week program hosted and sponsored by the Armstrong Partnership, where they received an additional \$400 to go towards their initiative. In addition, Tasneem has since registered Art Ignite as a non-profit and received larger grants with letters of support and help on grant applications through VIBE, and even invited former VIBE Arts staff to be a part of her board of directors. Art Ignite aims to provide
free or low-cost visual art workshops and exhibitions catering mainly to Flemingdon Park residents.

Igho has also expanded her Young EGO (Ebony Girls Organization) Initiative through a residency that was funded through VIBE Arts in collaboration with A Different Booklist, and through her recent
application and successful pitch at Artreach's Pitch Contest, winning second place, where she has received professional coaching and small scale funding to continue her creative writing and selfcare programming for young Black girls.
